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THE GROWING SEED

According to Mark's gospel, Jesus began teaching in parables shortly after appointing the twelve. A parable is a wise saying or short fictitious story used by Jesus to set forth His teaching. Parables may contain allegorical elements.

Today we hear the parables of the growing seed and of the mustard seed. Jesus is telling His disciples about His Church: The preaching of the gospel (the generously scattered seed) will unfailingly yield its fruit, independent of who sows or reaps – it is God who gives the growth (1 Corinthians 3:5-9).

This also refers to the action of grace in each soul: God silently works a transformation in each one of us causing us to make resolutions which shape our soul. We resolve to be faithful, surrender ourselves, respond to grace. Our callings and responses may be different as we are individuals (Ephesians 4:11-13). Even though we must make the decision to become a follower of Christ, it is the Holy Spirit who, working within us, gives a supernatural tone to our thoughts, desires and actions.

The main meaning of this parable has to do with the contrast between the great and the small. The seed of the Kingdom of God on earth is something very tiny to begin with (Luke12:32; Acts 1:19); but it will grow to be a big tree. The seed is planted in Peter and the apostles, has set its roots in Rome, and has grown to be a big tree: one which encompasses the whole world; a great multitude which "no man can number" (Revelation 7:9).

This growth also occurs in each soul. As predicted in the responsorial psalm [Psalm 92:12 (92:13 in the New American Bible)] "The righteous grow like a cedar in Lebanon." To allow the mercy of God to exalt us, to make us grow, we must make ourselves small and humble.

I do pray that this Sunday finds you well. After affirming the divinity of Jesus Christ by stating that he is the Son of God and equal to the Father, the Nicene Creed turns, with a few quick, clever strokes, to his passion and death, so this "Corner" we are going to reflect on this paragraph of the Nicene Creed: For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

The last day in Jesus' earthy existence is summed up in the words: "For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered, died, and was buried." In the previous sentence the Creed proclaimed: "For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven." As if to drive this point home, the Creed prefaces its short account of the passion by reminding us that Jesus suffered, not for himself, but "for our sake." Sinless as he was, there was no need for him to be crucified in order to save himself. He did not need redemption. We are the sinful ones who are desperately dependent upon a savior.


This paragraph is directly connected to the previous. Jesus became man in order to accomplish the work of our salvation. It was for us that Jesus was crucified. The Council Fathers include, "under Pontius Pilate" to show that this was a historical reality. It really happened. By mentioning the Roman governor Pontius Pilate, the Creed clearly locates the passion and death of Jesus in human history. We are not dealing here with some philosophical theory that could happen anywhere anytime. Pilate was governor of Judea in Palestine about the year 30 A.D. That is a fact that can be established by secular history. Jesus, therefore, being a member of the Jewish race, was put to death under this Roman official in Palestine. Crucifixion was the most severe form of capital punishment in Roman law. It was considered so degrading that it could not be applied in the case of Roman citizens. It was reserved for slaves, robbers, and outlaws. Jesus had foretold what kind of death he would die when he said: "And I, if I be lifted up, will draw all things to myself" (Jn 12:32). Crucifixion, certainly, was a most severe form of suffering, followed by a sure death. (catholiceducation.org) I could write a month's Corner on this terrible type of punishment!

So too, Jesus truly rose from the dead on the third day after being buried. Forty days after rising from the dead, He lifted Himself up into Heaven in a mysterious fashion and He now reigns in Heaven as King at the right hand of the Father. We believe that He will come again in glory. This is what we call the Second Coming. At the second coming of Christ, we will all be judged; everything we have done will be laid bare and true justice will be accom-

plished. This second coming will result in the passing away of the old Heaven and the old Earth and the establishing of Jesus' everlasting kingdom. (catholiclink.org)

During the week, we should ask ourselves why Jesus suffered. The answer is: for our sake. Because of the first sin of Adam we were cut off from the life of grace, excluded from heaven and condemned to die. Jesus took it upon himself to make satisfaction for us and so to pour out the grace of God upon us. It was part of the mysterious plan of God, hidden from all eternity, that this should be accomplished by the suffering and death of the Christ, the "man of sorrows" (Isaiah 53:3).

In the Gospel, Jesus says: "This is how it is with the reign of God. A man scatters seed on the ground. He goes to bed and gets up day after day. Through it all the seed sprouts and grows without his knowing how it happens."

Blessed Carlo Acutis (1991-2006)

"To be always close to Jesus, that's my plan." Carlo Acutis was an Italian website designer who documented Eucharistic miracles and approved Marian apparitions, and catalogued both on a website he designed before his death from leukaemia. Acutis was noted for his cheerfulness, computer skills, and devotion to the Eucharist, which became a core theme of his life. (Wikipedia)

Cardinal Marcello Semeraro, Prefect of the Dicastery for the Causes of Saints, met Thursday [May 23, 2024] with Pope Francis, who approved the promulgation of several decrees related to the causes of canonization of several men and women

For young Catholics, the most interesting is surely the recognition of a miracle attributed to Blessed Carlo Acutis.



The young layman was born on May 3, 1991, in London, England, and died on October 12, 2006, in Monza, Italy, succumbing to leukemia at the age of 15. Pope Francis beatified the millenial in 2020 in Assisi, where Blessed Carlo had made multiple pilgrimages and where his mortal remains rest.

In the May 23rd decree Pope Francis announced he will convene a Consistory of Cardinals to deliberate the canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis.





Your contributions will be combined with those of Catholics from around the world to help the Holy Father reach out to the voiceless and most vulnerable in need.


