THE MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS



The Feast of the Sacred Heart is celebrated on June 7 this year. It always falls on the first Friday after the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. When we think of the human heart, we think of a muscle that pumps blood throughout the human body. To worship such a thing as the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus might sound strange to the ears of a non-Catholic. To a Catholic, however, it is a very moving and thoroughly human way of relating to the Lord.

The Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus is not about the heart as a muscle but as representing the center, the soul, the deepest truth about the Lord. We can trace the story of God's love throughout history. There is God's love in creating and caring for the people of Israel. There is God's love in becoming human and sharing life on this planet. There is Christ's love in giving His life to reopen the way to salvation. There is Christ's love in sustaining the Church in truth during times of crisis and sending holy ones to show the way to deeper faith. There is Christ's love present in our life guiding, correcting, inspiring, leading and helping.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart has been present in the life of the Church in one way or another through the centuries. It was first expressed through reflection on the blood and water flowing from Jesus' side on the Cross as a river that powers the sacraments. In the Middle Ages, it took the form of meditation on the sacred Humanity of Jesus shown in the crucifixes that portrayed His dying or His death. In the 17th century, devotion to the Sacred Heart manifested itself dramatically in the Lord's apparitions to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, giving us His twelve promises and the image of Jesus - as is now commonly portrayed - pointing to His Heart. In our own time, we have the Divine Mercy devotion that draws together the centuries of meditation on Jesus' Sacred Heart.

The loving mercy of Jesus in forgiving repentant sinners is the thread that links all the various forms of the Sacred Heart devotion. By instinct, we are ready to believe in God's judgment. What we find hard to accept and understand is His mercy, perhaps because mercy is not a virtue widely practiced in our world. Maybe through devotion to the Sacred Heart, we can reintroduce the virtue of mercy to those around us. It is difficult to ask for something we are unwilling to give. Showing mercy is an important part of devotion to the Sacred Heart.

Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, Have Mercy on Us!



Happy Sunday St. Francis of Assisi Parish and welcome to the 10th Sunday in Ordinary Time. For this Corner, we will be "talking" about *and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man* from the Nicene Creed.

This Line is so very important because it proclaims, without any doubt, that Jesus Christ, though remaining God, was born into the world just like us from the womb of His mother. Just as the Arians doubted the divinity of Christ, there were other theologians who doubted

the true humanity of Christ and the fact that He was born into the world. It was too much for them to believe that God would stoop so low as to come in the flesh.

The Church points out three important teachings in this line of the Creed: (1) The Son of God took flesh and was conceived in the womb of the Virgin Mary. This rejected the teaching of some theologians who claimed that Jesus only "appeared" to be a man – He didn't actually assume a human nature. (2) Jesus was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit. There was no sexual intercourse involved in His conception; it was an action on the part of God that allowed Mary to conceive Jesus in her womb. Jesus had no human father like us. (3 The words, "He became man" were added to exclude the error that the Son of God merely "dwelt" in Jesus but did not actually become man.

There was a serious heresy in the second and third century that had no doubts about Jesus' divine nature, but they could not believe that He had a human nature. These folks were called Docetists, from the Greek word "Dokein," which means to appear or to seem like something real. They refused to believe that God Himself would dwell in a "defiled" human nature. For them, human nature was unfit for anything sacred. It was at the First Council of Constantinople (381) that one of the great saints of the Church, Gregory Nazainzus, proclaimed that "whatever is not assumed is not redeemed." In other words, whatever Jesus did not assume, He did not redeem. If He did not take humanity fully unto Himself, humanity could not be saved from sin and death. Jesus had to be fully human, just as He was fully divine. This is a very deep thought, so please reflect on this statement for a few moments.

We must always remember that Jesus was not two persons. This was condemned at the Council of Ephesus in 431. They proclaimed that Jesus Christ, the Son of God, fully divine and fully human, was born of the Virgin Mary. Thus, they also proclaimed that Mary was truly the Mother of God, not just the mother of Jesus of Nazareth (His humanity). This teaching helped to clear-up some confusion concerning Christ's humanity and divinity and the fact that the two cannot be separated – Jesus was a person – not two persons. (stsppchurch.com)

By the free choice of Mary, our Mother, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, the Word of God took on flesh. Jesus Christ, the uncreated Word through which all things were made, condescended to share in our humanity. The almighty God emptied Himself and took on the form of a slave, to use the language of St. Paul. In the Latin Rite, there is a tradition of bowing during this paragraph in honor of the Incarnation. The Incarnation is literally the "enfleshment" of Jesus; it is what we celebrate at Christmas. This paragraph marks one of the most important moments in human history. Our God became one of us. (catholic-link.org)

It is a dogma of the Catholic faith that God became man in Jesus. The more we reflect on this mystery, the more astounded we should be by the amazing love that God has for us. Let's consider what we mean by the Incarnation. First of all, God became what we are (short of sin) – weak creatures, tied down by limitation of space and time. Various theologians of the past attempted to explain this mystery but failed; they could not

accept the full reality that God became man. Some said that Jesus was only a holy man who was "adopted" by God and elevated to the level of divine. Others claimed that Jesus, though God Himself, only appeared to be a man, not actually made of flesh and blood as we are. All these theories come down to one thing – they deny that Jesus Christ is both True God and True Man.

I can only imagine the "conversations" at these councils! Take some time today and reflect on today's Corner and thank God for these men who fought for the Truth.


YOUR KARM DONATIONS BENEFIT THE SVDP FOOD PANRY
