

THE GIFT OF SIGHT: PHYSICAL, MORAL, AND SPIRITUAL



Today's first reading from Jeremiah speaks of the rejoicing of the blind as their sight is restored. In the Gospel, Jesus cures the blind man Bartimaeus. This is the last miracle Jesus performs before entering Jerusalem and His passion. Jesus performs this miracle in fulfillment of Jeremiah's prophecy that in the day of the Messiah the blind would once more see. The point is not what Jesus did for Bartimaeus, but what He can do for us because there are many kinds of blindness.

There is, of course, physical blindness - the absence of vision. Physical sight is vital to all of us. Apart from not being able to see trees and sunsets, the blind person cannot see a car coming, the stranger lurking, the symptoms of a disease, the expression on the face of a person speaking to him or her. Physical blindness is dangerous. So, we can understand the thrill of Bartimaeus' cure. A whole new world opened up for him.

There is another kind of blindness, even more dangerous than physical blindness, and that is moral blindness. Our moral sight or vision is called conscience. We are all born with it. It develops as we grow, is fine-tuned by experiences, and is enlightened by the Gospel. It helps us see right and wrong. The gift of conscience, a kind of moral eyesight, is a magnificent gift that helps us know right from wrong. Following it is another step. It is a gift to know when we have failed, betrayed another, when we have rebelled, when our life is on the wrong track, when we are headed for destruction. It is healthy to feel shame, regret, and guilt because those are the warning signs of a working conscience, our moral radar that helps us get back on track.

Our dignity as human beings is being able to see not just trees, plants, mountains and sunsets but to see right and wrong. Conscience is that very personal space where our Creator calls us from within to follow the light. Physical blindness endangers the body, but moral blindness endangers the soul. The gift of moral sight or conscience is what makes us human beings different from the rest of creation.

There is a third kind of blindness beside the physical kind and the moral kind, and that is the blindness of unbelief. Faith gives us vision to see beyond the senses, beyond the world around us to its deeper truth that it has come from God and is the place of our journey back to God.

Faith enables us to see that we are more than cells and bones, more than our DNA, more than the chemicals and events that happen inside us. We are more than our emotions and feelings, more than our IQ. We have a

soul, a purpose, and a destiny. Through the glasses of faith, we can see that however others may see us, God sees in us a person with an immortal soul who has a destiny to live with God forever. Faith enables us to see more in ourselves than others see.

When Jesus cured Bartimaeus, He was acknowledging and teaching the immense value every person has in His sight. It is too bad that we often look at ourselves through the eyes of others rather than through the eyes of God.

Physical sight comes through our eyes; moral sight comes through our conscience; spiritual sight comes through our faith. As we hear the story of blind Bartimaeus, let us thank God for the gift of sight and resolve to take care to respect and not endanger the gift of physical sight, the gift of moral sight called conscience, and the gift of spiritual sight called faith.



APOSTLES, MARTYRS, AND SAINTS

Good and happy Sunday, St. Francis! I do hope you enjoyed the time we spent with the Apostles. I know I got "VERY LONG" with most of them, and that was with just *touching* the surface of the information!

The Twelve Apostles of Jesus were twelve common Jewish men who walked upon the face of our earth with the Son of God. They were fishermen, farmers, and a tax collector. None of the men were scholars or politicians. They all had the blessing of listening to Jesus in person as He preached the Good News of the Kingdom of God. They were with Him as He worked His many miracles. The Apostles shared with Jesus their meals, their lodgings, and the sweat and dirt and all of the other hardships of being on the road. They were witnesses to our Lord's humanity, His infinite love and human frustrations, and His occasional anger and personal grief. From the most ordinary of daily tasks to the glory of His Resurrection, they were with Him. Yes, even though they all abandoned Him at the Cross, except for John, Jesus did not abandon them! After the Lord's ascension into heaven and the first Pentecost, these twelve men (I'm including Matthias) would all dedicate their lives to spreading His Good News of salvation to the entire known world. And in the end, this devotion to delivering the Word of God would cost all of them their lives.

I know that there is a belief among some Christian sects that all that truly matters is the Living Word of God that the Twelve Apostles shared with the world - that choosing to visit their graves or to pray for intercessory help is a waste of time. These same people will say this about the martyrs and all of the other Christian saints! I DO beg to differ with this thinking. Is it wrong to honor their memories, to reflect on their lives so that my life may be better? And to ask for intercessory prayer? Especially with the Twelve, we KNOW they are in the presence of Love Himself, what better person to ask to pray for you than them?

Reflecting on my last comments above, I wish for you all to contemplate on our next special feast day in the calendar of the Church. This coming week we will be celebrating All Saints Day and All Souls Day. Then for the month of November our parish has designated a special area of the church for all of us to bring pictures of our deceased loved ones. I always love and look forward to when our parish provides a time for our families in heaven.

"The devotion to the saints that is so much a part of our Catholic tradition began with devotion to the martyrs. The early Christians saw their fellow Christians display magnificent heroism in the face of persecution even to the point of giving their life. They then prayed to these martyrs, now their friends in heaven, that they would have the same kind of courage when faced with trial and possible death. We can turn to the martyrs when our faith is weak or seems to have dried up. They can intercede for us to renew our faith, be strong in our trust in Christ, and be bold in our practice of the faith. We should remember that the Church's martyrs are not confined to the first four centuries of the Church's life. Today, there are martyrs in South America, Eastern Europe and Africa. When

we read about a modern-day martyr, we can ask for his or her intercession that we would be strong in an age of weakness, firm in a time of compromise, and faithful in a world of second thoughts." This quoted paragraph is taken from a daily Mass homily by Deacon Jim on the feast day of St. Januarius, September 19, 2024. Thank you, Deacon!

Advent Retreat with Fr. Julian Peters, OSB

Fr. Julian Peters, OSB, a monk and priest of Saint Meinrad Archabbey, currently serves as director of the Institute for Priests and Presbyterates at Saint Meinrad. He is also a member of the Archabbot's Council, and one of the commuting chaplains for the

Benedictine Sisters of the Monastery Immaculate Conception in Ferdinand, IN.

Fr. Julian was born October 29, 1960, in Toledo, OH. He entered the monastery on August 5, 1982, and professed his solemn vows on August 15, 1986. He was ordained a priest on May 7, 1988. Fr. Julian attended both Saint Meinrad College and School of Theology, receiving a bachelor's degree in Classics (Latin) in 1982 and a Master of Divinity in 1988. In 1994, he received a master's degree in non-profit administration from the University of Notre Dame.
