

## PATIENT EXPECTATION AND FAITHFUL SURRENDER



This is the last weekend of Advent! We are only a few days away from celebrating once again the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, and the message we receive in our liturgy is powerful. God keeps promises! When we grasp this eternal truth and let it get inside of us, we are overwhelmed with gratitude and joy.

Each year, the gospel passage for the fourth Sunday of Advent is a story of Mary's pregnancy. This year is the story of the Visitation. Because it is so familiar, we can gloss over

some of the details. After being told by the angel that she is pregnant with the Son of God, Mary utters the great prayer – the Magnificat – "May it done to me according to your word." She answers with a beautiful and powerful YES to God's invitation. And then we hear in today's gospel that Mary "traveled to the hill country in haste."

I could imagine that there were plenty of things for Mary to do immediately following this unexpected news. Just think of what we do today to prepare for a child – doctor's visits, preparing a crib or nursery, the worries, the stresses, the excitements! St. Luke however does not include any of these preparations in the account. Rather, we are told of Mary's immediate, hasty visit to her cousin Elizabeth. You might thing that the last thing Mary needed was a long journey to the hillside, but this is what she does. And so, despite all that the gospel writer could have focused on, Luke includes the visit and the embrace of these two women, Elizabeth and Mary, and their two different experiences of motherhood. The contrast and the tension of these two mothers are brought together in a beautiful embrace. Not only the embrace of Elizabeth and Mary, but also the embrace of John the Baptist and Jesus.

Despite the contrast, both mothers are open to God's work through them in such a beautiful and profound way, though neither could possibly know what it would require of them or of their sons. Both of these women model a gift of faith and will literally nurture God's presence on earth.

In Elizabeth, we see an example of faith through long suffering. How many of us here have desired something? Perhaps it is a child, but perhaps it is more stable employment? Or freedom from an illness, an addiction, or an affliction? How many of us have wanted this for a loved one? How many of us have been teetering on the edge of despair and trying to hold onto hope in the face of this long disappointment. How many of us have been angry with God in the face of these circumstances?

In Mary we see an example of faith in unexpected hardship. Certainly, children are a gift, but not without difficul-

ty. How many of us have encountered a hardship and struggled to see it as a gift? How many of us are called by God to take a step into the unknown, to leave comfort and safety, and to follow God in an unexpected way?

This is why Mary goes with haste to meet her cousin Elizabeth. This is why St. Luke includes this story in the gospel and why the church gives us this gospel on the last Sunday before Christmas. Both Mary and Elizabeth model for us the patient expectation and the faithful surrender that will be answered by the coming Christ. Like Mary and Elizabeth, may we be open to the unexpected and awesome gift of God in our lives.





OMGOSH! We have arrived at the Fourth Sunday in Advent! WHERE did the time go??? OK, I'm calmed down now..... Let's begin again: Here we are! Happy Fourth Sunday of Advent! The tidbit I would like to share this week concerns the fourth candle on the Advent wreath. It is called the Angels' Candle. Luke, in his Gospel, tells us about the angel who visited Zechariah to inform him that he and Elizabeth would have a son. (Sound familiar? Remember Sts. Anne and Joachim?) The angel also appeared to Mary to tell her that God had chosen her to be the mother of Jesus. Later a chorus of angels sang songs of praise to God to the shep-

herds in their fields. Matthew, in his Gospel, tells us that on the last day, Jesus will send out His angels to the four corners of the earth to gather his chosen people from one end of the earth to the other. (Matthew 24:31)

On this Fourth weekend of Advent, I would like to reflect on the Second Luminous Mystery which is the wedding feast at Cana. Bishop Barron comments in his prelude to the Second Luminous Mystery: "Weddings are a consistent biblical symbol for the mystical union between God and His people. God wants to marry His people Israel because He loves them so passionately. He wants to fill them with His own life - consummating the marriage if you will. Now what is the fulfillment of this prophecy? Nothing other than the incarnation. When a divine nature and a human nature came together in the unity of a divine person to form a marriage between God and Israel. Jesus is the Wedding of heaven and earth, the marriage of divinity and humanity. He is the Bridegroom and the Church (US!) is the bride in Him the most intimate union is achieved between God and the world. At this wedding, Jesus changes 180 gallons of water into the wine of the divine life......an intoxication of grace. When we are infused with the divine life, when we are married to God, life never runs out."

When you recite this decade of the Second Luminous Mystery, "consider the great mystery of Christ's own wedding feast, the abundance of divine grace coming to Israel and all of humanity through the incarnation."

Whenever I reflect on this scripture reading/ Second Luminous Mystery of the Wedding at Cana, I think of how Mary reacted to the request from the "servers." The servers came to Mary with the request, then Mary went to Jesus with the request and then Jesus fulfilled the request. When I reflect on this scripture from the Gospel of John 2:1-11, it reinforces my prayers of intercession to Mother Mary. There have been times in my life that only my "Momma Mary" could handle for me.

I certainly hope you enjoyed the "meditations" from Bishop Robert Barron. They are from the Hallow App with Bishop Barron leading the recitation of the different Mysteries of the Rosary. In addition, I would like ya'll to know I had a little bit of help deciding which mysteries to use for the Four Weeks of Advent: thank you Debbie Eberhardt, Martha Frink and Deacon Jim! I appreciate your input and your insight.

In a few days we will be celebrating the Birth of our Savior and Lord Jesus Christ, so if I don't get a chance to see/talk with you, I would like to wish everyone from our beautiful "Little Church on the River" a very Happy and Merry Christmas at St. Francis of Assisi!
