BAPTISM - A BRIDGE BETWEEN HEAVEN AND EARTH

This is the last weekend of the Christmas Season. Most people have their Christmas decorations down by now – except the Church. The church continues to celebrate the feast of Christmas and Epiphany until the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which we celebrate this Sunday.

God began to reveal his Son to the world with the coming of the magi, but for those who came to Mass during this past week, each day's gospel tried to show the uniqueness of Jesus.

Today we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. Our first thought might be to ask why Jesus was baptized. He was free from sin, so he had no need of the baptism of repentance that John led people to accept. Through his baptism, Jesus opened the waters of baptism for us, creating a bridge between heaven and earth, a way for us to be plunged into his life, death, and resurrection. With the Baptism of the Lord, God reveals that Jesus is filled with the Spirit and is God's beloved Son with whom God is greatly pleased.

After years of waiting and preparing, the time had come for Jesus to take up his mission. No longer would he remain hidden away in Nazareth, quietly plying his trade as a carpenter. Now was the time to play his part in the Father's plan, the time to announce and to inaugurate the kingdom of God. Now was the time for healings, exorcisms, preaching, and teaching.

This great kingdom was not to begin with a blare of trumpets or a mighty demonstration of miracles. It would begin not in glory, but in humility, as Jesus submitted himself to a baptism of repentance. He, the sinless one, would heed the Baptizer's call to sinners. The one who had been clothed in glory would bow to one clothed in rough garments. He, the righteous one, would identify himself with sinners to fulfill all righteousness.

Mathew said that when Jesus came up out of the water, the Spirit descended on him and the Father testified of him, declaring him to be his "beloved Son," and that he was "well pleased" with him. By recounting Jesus' baptism in this way, Mathew emphasized Jesus role as the servant of the Lord identified in Isaiah's prophecy. Like this servant, Jesus had come to "bring forth justice," to open blind eyes, and to release prisoners. Even more importantly, like the servant of the Lord, he had come to make a sin offering of himself, bearing others' sins and interceding for their forgiveness.

In Romans and Galatians, Paul said that at our baptism we were baptized into Christ. Jesus' baptism was our baptism as well. Just as the Spirit descended on Jesus, so too the Spirit comes upon us when we are baptized. Just as the Father declared Jesus to be his beloved Son, we too become beloved sons and daughters of God at our baptism. Just as Jesus took up his commission as a servant, we too are called to lay down our lives for the up-building of the kingdom.

Confident in the Spirit's anointing and filled with the humility of Christ, let us take up our high calling to serve our Father with the joy and abandonment of dearly loved sons and daughters.





AMBOS, AND LECTERNS, AND PULPITS, OH MY!

Happy Baptism of the Lord, St. Francis of Assisi! To begin to "talk" about different questions concerning the Mass, let's first reflect on the structure of the Mass. The Mass is made up, as it were, of two main parts: the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. These, however, are so closely interconnected that they form but one single act of worship. [GIRM pg. 19.] The Mass is the GREATEST prayer of the

Church! In addition, there are also certain rites that open and conclude this great celebration. (Remember, I've written about the four parts of the Mass before!)

Well, the first question I received is "What can be proclaimed or said from the "lectern" which is properly called the ambo?" Here's a little history for you: Ambo (pl. Ambos, or Ambones), is a word of Greek origin, supposed to signify a mountain or elevation. Take a moment and reflect on Isaiah 54:10. This Greek word also has a meaning of 'both.' This is to symbolize the readings from both, the ambo and the lectern. Ambones are believed to have taken their origin from the raised platform from which the Jewish rabbis read the Scriptures to the people, and they were first introduced into churches during the fourth century. In the 1200s, there were two ambones and they were "two-stories high." The lower one was used for reading/proclaiming the Epistle, and the upper one was used for reading/proclaiming the Gospel. They were known as "double-deckers." Makes sense, right?

The ambo is stationary and was designed for the minister of the Word only. This is where the minister of the Word proclaims from the Old Testament, from the book of Psalms (the Responsorial Psalm), where the Priest or Deacon proclaims the Gospel, delivers the homily, and leads the Universal Prayer. On the other hand, a lectern (such as that of the cantor lectern or the lectern at the Priest's chair in our church) is movable and intended for any non-scripture "deliveries" to the congregation.

As far as the question is concerned, there are very particular guidelines/rules regarding what can be proclaimed or said from the ambo: Scripture is to be proclaimed from the ambo and non-scripture elements (announcements, commentaries, appeals, etc...) are to be delivered from a lectern or another suitable area in the church. But our beautiful little church building has only one high-visibility area for any kind of proclamation/commentaries/special announcements - the ambo on the altar. Granted, Mass commentaries should not be delivered from the ambo, but because Mass commentaries need to be delivered from a location in the church where the congregation can hear and see the minister delivering the commentary, the ambo is the only reasonable place in our church building - same with appeals and special announcements.

The ambo is still the official Catholic term for the place where the Gospel (technically ALL scripture) is read. In common speech, ambos are incorrectly called pulpits, a Protestant word. There are no pulpits in the Catholic Church. The pulpit is not a Catholic word.

I have a very good friend who is a priest, and he could recite many Gospels from memory. People would marvel at his memory, but then ask me, does the priest (or deacon) have to read directly from the Book of the Gospels? I know people don't like book response answers, but according to the GIRM, the priest is to take the Book of the Gospels to the ambo and then proclaim the Gospel. While it's implied that the priest reads from the text, there's no written requirement. However, he is required to have the text in front of him when he recites the Gospel. For more information read GIRM 133-134. Have a blessed week St. Francis!



Jubilee Year 2025, themed "Pilgrims of Hope," began Dec. 24, 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica, and will conclude Jan. 6, 2026.
