DEACON'S **NOTES**

THE IMPORTANCE OF THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

We have a visiting priest this weekend, but I wanted to share with you some thoughts on marriage. This year, my wife and I will celebrate our 29th wedding anniversary. It is hard to believe! We came together rather late in life. We had both been divorced and had kids of our own so when our families were blended, to say there were challenges would be an understatement. But here we are 29 years later and still going strong. Of the four kids between us three remain and are adults now. A son and two daughters. Sadly, our youngest daughter passed away over three years ago now. But between the four of them Lesa and I

have seven grandchildren. It is such a joy to see your kids grow up and become the people they were meant to be. And grandkids are pretty cool too!

In spite of the many things my wife and I have learned about each other and about marriage over the years, we have both come to the realization that no matter how great your marriage is today, there is always room for improvement. There is always a place for us to give God more control in our relationship with our spouse.

Some time ago, I read a story about a couple who celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary. Ted and Bessie were in their seventies. Ted had lost much of his hearing during this time. And yet they were still getting along together and celebrating this great milestone. Their rather large family came from all over and enjoyed celebrating together through the midmorning into the afternoon. Finally, toward sundown, all the family went home. Bessie and Ted decided to walk out on the front porch and sit down on the swing and watch the sunset. The old gentleman pulled his tie loose and leaned back and didn't say much. Bessie looked at him somewhat in wonder and said to him, "You know, Ted, I'm real proud of you." The old gentleman turned and looked at her rather quizzically and after a moment said, with a puzzled look on his face, "Well, Bessie, I'm real tired of you too!"

So why the Wedding Feast to start His ministry? Because of the importance of the Sacrament of Marriage, and because of the importance of His mother. She intercedes for us. If God does not answer your prayers, talk to Mary she knows how to get His attention. Peter Kreeft says that "Mary is the neck that can turn the Head."

God wants marriages to be strong. He wants them to last. He wants them to be a reflection of His relationship with His redeemed people. He wants them to bring glory to His name. How can we accomplish these things? As married couples we should be willing to:

- 1. Help each other
- 2. Listen to each other
- Learn from each other.
- 4. Allow our spouse to correct us

That last one was particularly difficult for me. Just ask my wife. But over the years I have come to value her good judgement and wisdom. The point is then that all of our actions should be out of love and respect for Christ, His Blessed Mother, and for each other, Amen.

Welcome to this week's Catechism Corner where we will "talk" about the liturgy of the Word and our postural response/behavior during other parts of the Mass."

We proclaim the scripture readings during Mass very reverently and the silence that is allowed between readings is not only helpful, but necessary to promote meditation. The GIRM 45 states: "Sacred silence also, as part of the celebration, is to be observed at the designated times. Its nature, however, depends on the moment when it occurs in the different parts of the celebration. For in the Penitential Act and again after the invita-

tion to pray, individuals recollect themselves; whereas after a reading or after the Homily, all meditate briefly on what they have heard; then after Communion, they praise God in their hearts and pray to him." I LOVE the silence between our readings/responsorial psalm. I've been to churches where it's like a race to see who can have the fastest Mass! Even before the celebration itself, it is a praiseworthy practice for silence to be observed in the church, in the sacristy, in the vesting room, and in adjacent areas, so that all may dispose themselves to carry out the sacred celebration in a devout and fitting manner.

Here at St. Francis, there are members who like to recite the Rosary before Mass – a most beautiful prayer and meditative way to prepare for Mass. But because of the design of our building, the conversations in Shea Hall frequently interferes with this devotion. Understand, we are all about building community! Try to remember there is a time and place for this community building.

My Protestant friends say that at Mass we do "Catholic Calisthenics!" You know, stand, sit, kneel, stand, kneel etc.! Being a cradle Catholic it's a no brainer for me, but I can understand how confusing it can be. And that is why I bring this up because in the last few years I've noticed there is some confusion as to when we are to stand at a certain point of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Particularly after the "presentation and preparation of the gifts." These gifts are collected for the poor and for the Church. Bread and wine are brought to the altar table, and everything is prepared for the celebration. If no chant is sung, the Priest may pray aloud, and all may respond: Blessed be God for ever. Usually, at weekend Mass there is music during this time in the liturgy. If you recollect, we in the pews, are seated. Then the Priest extends his hands and says a prayer (we should still be seated!) as the Priest concludes his prayer THEN we stand and respond: May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church. (This is taken from the Missalette page 11. The one in the pews have everything we do, say, and sing in it!)

I've noticed that people start to stand as the Priest is praying which makes it hard to hear and concentrate on what is being said. My former parish up north was having the same problem. The Church building there is very noisy because of tile instead of carpet and the ceiling is VERY tall. So, the Priest there raises his hands to pray and waits for all the noise to subside and continues. Is this right? Good question, so please read page 11 in the Missalette. It tells you the rubrics!

Next week we will "talk" about the orans posture during the Mass. Don't know what that is – stay tuned! Have a most wonderful winter week in our beautiful East Tennessee!





JUBILEE 2025

Jubilee Year 2025, themed "Pilgrims of Hope," began Dec. 24, 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica, and will conclude Jan. 6, 2026. This year of grace offers the Catholic faithful an opportunity for spiritual renewal, emphasizing themes of forgiveness, reconciliation and the universal call to holiness.

The practice of a jubilee year has ancient roots in the Jewish tradition and evidence for it can be found in the Old Testament. The jubilee was called every 50 years and was a time for forgiveness and a reminder of God's providence and mercy.

The dedication of a year for this emphasis provided the community with a time to come back into right relationship with one another and with God. As the practice of the jubilee year was adopted into the Church, these themes of mercy, forgiveness, and solidarity continued.
