AN UNCONDITIONAL JOURNEY WITH JESUS



Once again, we have a visiting priest this weekend. Fr. Antonio will return next weekend. In the meantime, here are some thoughts on this weeks Gospel for the 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time. As we settle into ordinary time, the Sunday Gospel readings will come from Luke. Today he tells us that he has investigated the events of Jesus' time among us. He goes on to say that he wants to write them down for his friend Theophilus. He does this so that we will have a record of what Jesus has taught.

Luke's Gospel is written sixty or seventy years after our Lord's death. Up until then the only record of Jesus' life had been through word of mouth. Luke wanted to get the Word out - as it were - in order to attract new members. According to Luke, Jesus' public ministry began in a synagogue. We heard Jesus read from the prophet Isaiah and then tell the people that God is fulfilling this prophecy in him. He has just been anointed by the Spirit in his baptism in the Jordan. Now he comes to bring good news to all who trust in God's goodness. What he will say and what he will be doing is meant for those who have been suffering - captives, the blind, the oppressed. God has heard their cries and honors their faithful longing for salvation. God has sent Jesus to bring them liberty, recovery, freedom. He has come to proclaim a time that is God's. In Jesus, all who have waited will experience the loving-kindness, the mercy, and the compassion of God.

You and I suffer our own forms of captivity, blindness, and oppression. Have I, have you, been waiting for God? Do we trust in God's goodness and care for us? Luke reminds us: Jesus is God's loving-kindness. God's mercy, God's compassion, present among us. How is Jesus speaking to you, to me, in our suffering? What is he asking of me, of you? How is Jesus' gracious presence with me, with you, good news? How can his presence make a difference in the way you and I want to live today?

This is a year acceptable to the Lord. Jesus desires to love us and journey with us. Are you, am I, willing to make an unconditional journey with Jesus, trusting that he is leading us home to our Father's house? If we are, then let us make a conscious choice each day to call on Jesus often during the day and use the grace that he will surely give us.

Jesus' declaration in Luke 4:21 emphasizes the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies. This underscores the reliability and divine inspiration of Scripture. By claiming the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy, Jesus asserts His authority as the Messiah. Believers are called to recognize and submit to His authority in their lives. Despite the clear fulfillment of prophecy. Jesus faced skepticism and rejection in His hometown. This serves as a reminder that following Christ may lead to misunderstanding or rejection by those closest to us.

Happy weekend and welcome to the Catechism Corner! More questions about the Mass and hopefully answers for you this week!

During Mass you may notice the priest will at times assume the orans posture, which is when his hands are raised and outstretched with elbows at his sides, especially during the prayer of the Our Father. (Remember I touched on this last week.) You may notice that some members of the Faithful may join the presider in such a gesture. Would it surprise you to learn that doing so is contrary to Church teaching?

Ok, now remember I came from South Florida with Charismatic Masses. I've experienced the raising of hands, dancing in the aisle, speaking in tongues and slain in the spirit (where one would fall to the ground)! I even had a priest who instructed the people in the pews to reach across the aisle during the Our Father to hold hands – a BIG NO, NO!

Orans - from the Medieval Latin word "ōrāns" meaning one who is praying or pleading - is a posture of prayer where one standing has their hands outstretched sideways palms up, with their elbows close to the body. The Orans is seen as an ancient Christian symbol of a soul in union with God interceding on behalf of mankind, frequently depicted in Early Christian art in a gesture reminiscent of Christ's outstretched arms as He offered Himself on the Cross.

For centuries, the Our Father has been a pivotal part of Mass, taking place during the Liturgy of the Eucharist. However, because of language barriers and the development of rubrics, the Our Father was traditionally a prayer said by the presider on behalf of the congregation, **not with them**. Please note any prayer offered up to God by the priest is done assuming the orans position.

Liturgical reforms promulgated by Pope Pius XII on September 3,1958 granted permission for the lay faithful to join the priest in praying the Our Father. However, no prescriptions were made for the lay faithful to join the priest in the orans position, instead they are to remain standing with hands folded in prayer. "Since the Pater Noster is a fitting and ancient prayer of preparation for Communion, the entire congregation may recite this prayer in unison with the priest in low Masses; the Amen at the end is to be said by all." – Instruction on Sacred Music and Sacred Liturgy § 32 – uCatholic.com

The Church seems to be relatively silent on this matter. However, just because the Church is silent does not mean something is permitted. After all, no document states the laity cannot stand on their heads for the Our Father during Mass, yet we would universally consider it inappropriate to do so! The Sacramentary of the Roman Missal states the presider is to pray the Our Father with hands extended.

The above states the faithful are not to use any gesture reserved for the presider – which would include the orans posture.

We can look to Pope Saint John Paul II in 1997 for clarification where he delivered instructions "On Certain Questions Regarding the Collaboration of the Non-Ordained Faithful in the Sacred Ministry of Priest: Practical Provisions." The late pontiff said: "In eucharistic celebrations deacons and non-ordained members of the faithful may not pronounce prayers - e.g. especially the eucharistic prayer, with its concluding doxology – or any other parts of the liturgy reserved to the celebrant priest. Neither may deacons or non-ordained members of the faithful use gestures or actions which are proper to the same priest celebrant. It is a grave abuse for any member of the non-ordained faithful to "quasi preside" at the Mass while leaving only that minimal participation to the priest which is necessary to secure validity." – uCatholic.com



So, the question for us becomes: is the orans posture an addition to the liturgy? In my opinion, yes. My reasoning is that the General Instruction of the Roman Missal references the orans posture with the phrase "with hands extended." It is instructed to be done twenty-eight times and is used as a direction only for the priest(s) - the laity are never directed to pray "with hands extended." Given that it is clearly a directive in the GIRM, to add it to any other part of the liturgy would be a violation of the above stated liturgical rule.

As to the reason why this matter is rarely addressed, that most likely has to do with pastoral sensitivity. If a handful of people are innocently praying in that position, the priest is not going to go out of his way to embarrass them or cause them to feel uncomfortable. Their action, while not liturgically correct, is probably not a distraction to anyone around them. But as I said before, at the Charismatic Masses I attended, it appeared everyone was raising their hands! As you see, there are influences from other cultures that have crept into our Mass. Now, the only time I could see a priest feeling pastorally required to address such a situation would be if people were being instructed by others to use the orans posture, or if it was so widespread that those who chose not to do so were made to feel uncomfortable, like the priest in South Florida! I will tell you, though, the parishioners in South Florida did address this with the Archbishop! People would argue that the holding of hands brings unity to the congregation. Yes, I agree, but the true unity is brought through the celebration of the Eucharist. It is here we become one Body of Christ.

Now remember, don't shoot the messenger! I was asked this question, and I believe it is my responsibility to address it and tell the truth. Next week, we will continue to talk about questions concerning the Mass!



JUBILEE 2025

Jubilee Year 2025, themed "Pilgrims of Hope," began Dec. 24, 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica, and will conclude Jan. 6, 2026. This year of grace offers the Catholic faithful an opportunity for spiritual renewal, emphasizing themes of forgiveness, reconciliation and the universal call to holiness.

The practice of a jubilee year has ancient roots in the Jewish tradition and evidence for it can be found in the Old Testament. The jubilee was called every 50 years and was a time for forgiveness and a reminder of God's providence and mercy.

The dedication of a year for this emphasis provided the community with a time to come back into right relationship with one another and with God. As the practice of the jubilee year was adopted into the Church, these themes of mercy, forgiveness, and solidarity continued.
