#### **PERFECT JOY**

I love the Beatitudes. They were one of my mom's favorite verses. She chose Matthew's Beatitudes as the Gospel reading for her funeral Mass. Today we hear Luke's version. What we refer to as the Sermon on the Mount in Saint Matthew's Gospel is known as the Sermon on the Plain in St. Luke's Gospel. Both texts include the Beatitudes, words from Jesus to live by.



Happy, happy weekend St. Francis! This week in the Corner I'm going to try to explain the "rubrics" of the Mass! What are the rubrics of the Mass? I'm glad you asked! (Don't worry there will be no test or grade!)

Just like in Math you have a rubric which serves as a guideline for both teaching and grading, detailing the expectations for an assignment by articulating various performance levels and the criteria for each level.

Rubrics are the instructions for the Mass. They're something like the stage directions in a play. Most of the Mass is made up of spoken words, but the rubrics tell us how those words are to be spoken and what the priest and other participants should be doing while they're speaking them. When talking about the Catholic Mass, the liturgy of the Roman Rite in its Ordinary Form is governed by rubrics which are the rules and instructions for the recitation of the 1.) Divine Office, 2.) the celebration of Mass, and 3.) the administration of the sacraments. They provide guidance on how to participate in the Catholic Mass and other liturgical celebrations. An example of a "rubric" for the Mass would be "C. The Hymn Gloria in excelsis." When it is said read rubric #431 or when it is omitted read #432. And there are several specifics under each number!!

Observing the rubrics as laid down by the authority of the Church, is then, a vital part in regulating the public worship of God and ultimately in ensuring, particularly during the Mass, that all due reverence and honor are given to the Blessed Sacrament. It is for this reason that the rubrics, found for example in the Roman Missal, tend toward precision, but we must readily guard against celebrating the rules for themselves or allowing them to obscure the very reason for their function.

The General Rubrics of the Roman Missal include the Code of Rubrics and the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM). Needless to say, there is much thought, preparation, and prayer that goes into the proper celebration of Mass. Fortunately, JoAnne is very knowledgeable of the rubrics, not to mention the GIRM. We are blessed!

Here's a question I've been asked: is "Liturgical Dancing" permissible? In 1975, the Congregation for the Sacraments and Divine Worship prepared a document titled *Religious Dance, An Expression of Spiritual Joy* which it declared is to be treated as "an authoritative point of reference for every discussion on the matter." Although the document noted that religious dance plays a positive role in many cultures, dance has never been made an integral part of the official worship of the Latin Church. The document also names a number of specific cultures where religious dance plays or has played a role in the liturgy. Examples are Aztec dancers that honor Our Lady of Guadalupe and the Ethiopians. But the document is forceful in stating that this does not mean religious dance can be used in the liturgy in Western culture.

This does not mean that religious dance cannot be done at all. It can be done, but only when three conditions are met: 1.) that it not take place during the Mass, 2.) that it not take place in strictly liturgical areas (the sanctuary or nave of a church), and 3.) that priests do not participate in the religious dance. *Page 213 Mass Confusion* 

In 1994 the same Vatican congregation ruled: Among some peoples, singing is instinctively accompanied by hand-clapping, rhythmic swaying, and dance movements on the part of the participants. Such forms of external expression can have a place in the liturgical actions of these peoples on condition that they are always the expression of true communal prayer of adoration, praise, offering and supplication, and not simply a performance. (Instruction on Inculturation and the Roman Liturgy, 42)
