PASTOR'S NOTES

LIVING DEEPLY IN THE WATERS OF OUR OWN BAPTISM

Today's first reading is from the prophet Isaiah who lived about 725 years before Christ. He describes his call from God to be a prophet. The setting is in Jerusalem in the temple.

Notice he is unable to describe what God looks like. In this experience he becomes aware of his own unworthiness.

In the other two readings we hear how two other people experienced God in Jesus Christ:

Paul in his vision of Jesus Christ and Peter in the miraculous catch of fish. The Corinthians were having a problem accepting the idea of the resurrection of the body. They thought our body came back to life with the same problems, weaknesses, and flaws it had before we died. They thought their spirits would be freer without their bodies.

That's not so, Paul said. He tells them, "What I handed on to you, as of first importance, I also received." Because it is such an important doctrine, Paul dedicated the whole last part of his letter to the resurrection. Notice the kind of language he uses to indicate this is the Tradition of the Church: "I handed on to you what I also received." That is, this is what the Church always believed about Jesus, that although he was put to death, his body now lives and he is seated at the right hand of the Father. Paul goes on (beyond this passage) to explain how we too shall rise to new life with him. It is a new world God is creating, in the risen Lord Jesus.


That's where our gospel comes in: Peter and the apostles, who were among the many who visibly saw Jesus after his resurrection, would now be bringing people into God's perfect Kingdom, leading them through Baptism and the Eucharist to a new life, where there would be no more pain or suffering or even death.

Today's gospel passage from Luke reveals Jesus's authority to bring people to the Father. Jesus' inner life is revealed in Simon's anxiety about catching fish and making a life. Simon broke his routine, Peter had to let go of his control, his certainty about how to catch fish. He left a space in his heart for something new to happen, and he was overwhelmed by the miracle and overcome with joy.

We also carry the heavy burdens of our responsibilities as we work to make ends meet and sort through the daily chaos of life. We are all challenged to live in the constant unfolding of grace within our call as Christians.

Conversion is life-long. Change is food for our souls in Christ Jesus. Jesus calls us to respond to life and all of its complexities with hope and love. The call of Christ to follow, to become fishers of people to God, is to live deeply in the waters of our own baptism. The more we trust, the deeper our life is in Christ. Jesus asks us to dive into the deep end of the pool. Jesus is committed to us; He will not leave no matter what. Jesus said to Simon: 'Do not be afraid' When we look around and see that the world is in terrible shape, let us not lose hope. God hasn't abandoned us, rather God continues to send people who will help to establish his eternal kingdom, people like Isaiah, people like Paul, people like Peter and the apostles, people like you and me.





Welcome to the Catechism Corner where this week we will continue to answer questions concerning the Mass!

I have had questions regarding how the intentions listed in the Prayer of the Faithful (I like the acronym POF) or *Universal Prayer* are "created." Many people mistakenly call this the Prayers (plural) of the Faithful, when, in fact, it is a number of intentions gathered together to make ONE PRAYER of the Faithful.

During my experience formulating school Masses, I needed to educate myself with preparing "The Prayer of the Faithful." During this time within the Mass, the congregation prays for the needs of the Church and the world. The prayer is introduced by the presiding priest, and the people respond to each intention with a short invocation such as "Lord, hear our prayer." The intentions are personalized (look especially at number four below) and may vary based on the liturgical season. The GIRM (69) is very explicit with this information. The Prayer of the Faithful/Universal Prayer, typically follows this formula which includes intentions for 1) the Church, 2) public authorities and the salvation of the whole world, 3) those burdened by any kind of difficulty, and 4) the local community.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 1349) states that these intentions are a response to the Word of God and are an expression of the priestly people. Remember these intentions contain petitions, not words of thanksgiving or praise. These intentions are audibly expressed for the whole assembly to hear and respond to together with one voice. When looking at "the formula" there really is no need for anything else! And remember, we have private prayer time before Mass begins for the special prayers and intentions we hold in our heart for our family and friends.

Another question (many, actually) arises when talking about the "Sign of Peace." This part of the Mass is called the Rite of Peace which follows The Lord's Prayer wherein we have just prayed the Our Father: "And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us;" (Matt. 6:12).

Liturgical commentators regard the exchange of Peace <u>before the Offertory</u> as a symbol of mutual affection, connected with Matthew 5:23-24: "Therefore, if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift." - catholic.com

The Offertory is literally the offering of our "gifts" to God, so this is our chance to renew our charity, to make ourselves more worthy of making this offering. I don't know about you, but growing up in a large family of seven, it was "difficult" most times getting ready for Mass without some not-so-nice behavior! This part of the Mass was very important for us to forgive each other of actions prior to communion.

In the post-Vatican II liturgical reform, there was a desire to include the people more closely in the ceremony, which revived these dilemmas. At least in principle, a simultaneous handshake is quick, is hygienic, and can be done between men and women. Its weakness lies in undermining the connection between the peace exchanged among the people with the peace that comes from Christ, really present on the altar. To minimize disruption, the presider is actually forbidden from leaving the sanctuary to give the sign of Peace to the congregation (GIRM 82, 152), though this rule is often ignored. Remember that priest I've discussed before? Well, he would go up and down the middle aisle, talk about a disruption! (Forgive me Lord!) So, needless to say, it is advisable by the GIRM to offer the sign of peace only to those who are nearest to you (both sides and behind) and in a sober manner. (GIRM 82)




